

Canton church celebrates twenty-year milestone

Greater Love Worship Center (GLWC) will soon celebrate twenty years of ministry here in Canton.

To commemorate this special occasion, Pastors Calvin and Fredia Day will host a community outreach drive-through prayer, in the parking lot adjacent to The Venue of Canton, from 9 a.m. to 11a.m. on Saturday, June 28. Visitors will be able to drive into the parking lot and receive prayer and a goodie bag, without getting out of their car.

A free indoor "yard sale" is also planned during this time and will take place inside the venue itself.

"On Sunday, June 29, we will have a special morning service, beginning at 10 a.m., which will include an ordination ceremony for the first graduates of our Ministers-In-Training Program," said Pastor Fredia. "All are welcome and encouraged to attend."

Native Cantonian Calvin Day had known for many years that God was calling him and his wife, Fredia, to establish a church in order to serve the Canton area.

In 1996, the Days were called to relocate to Ypsilanti, Michigan, and, while there, were trained extensively by Apostle Robert Hill, his wife, Pastor Barbara Hill, and the seasoned members of the Pastoral Council at Christian Love Fellowship Ministries, International (CLFMI)

For the next five years and through many hours of prayer, study, Bible courses and hands-on experience, the Days were molded, shaped and prepared to do the work of the Lord.

The couple were then both ordained as ministers, under the direction of the Holy Spirit, by Apostle Hill and the governing body of CLFMI, receiving their credentials. As they patiently waited for God's

release to launch a church, the Days made prayerful preparation.

During this time, God ordered their steps to Springs of Praise World Outreach Center in Crystal Springs, led by Pastor Darryl

Blankenship and his wife, Sharon. This was an insightful, multi-racial congregation who exemplified the love of Christ and really showed the Days in a tangible way how to minister effectively to ALL people. After four years of prayer, the Days began the process of establishing a church. It began with just a handful of people who had expressed an interest in nondenominational ministry.

In the initial meeting, Pastor Calvin Day shared the vision God had given to him, as well as some preliminary plans. As a result, Day and his wife, five adult supporters and five children held their first worship service on July 10, 2005, at 357 West Peace Street in Canton, still known today as Greater Love Worship Center.

"In the years that followed, God has blessed the ministry," said Pastor Fredia. "He has taken us through times of growth, weeding out, ma-turing, refocusing and regrowth. In September 2008, we purchased the building, and, during the summer of 2010, we built the sanctuary we're now in.

As they embrace the work that God has placed in their hands, the Days strive to ensure that the vision of the church remains the driving force behind all that is said and done from that institution.

The leaders and members of Great-

er Love Worship Center seek to be a body of believers, disciples of Christ, sanctified to the purposes of God, holy in character and conduct. In addition to the Sunday morning service, GLWC also offers Enriched Adult Bible Study, Kingdom Kidz Youth Ministry, Ministers-In-Training Program and the Pregnancy Resource Room.

The Venue of Canton features Christian entertainment, and the stage play Are You Ready? will be sponsored by the church and performed locally in early 2026.

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



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


Nissan hosts second annual Cars and Coffee event in Canton

Victor Taylor, vice president of manufacturing at the Canton Vehicle Assembly Plant, said the event was




Canton celebrates law enforcement appreciation week with gratitude and food



ry. On June 5 and July 3, the Old Jail at 234 East Fulton Street will be open for tours and storytelling beginning


at 5 p.m., in conjunction with the weekly market.


beyond the classroom. Students receive up to \$5,000 to support their work.

Eight Canton High alumni march again, 50 years later

History repeated itself in golden fashion at Canton Public High School recently, as eight proud members of the Class of 1975 returned to their alma mater to march once more—this time in celebration of a 50-year milestone.

Dr. Marilyn Johnson-Luckett, Dr. Ruth Evans-Bowen, Dr. Linda Williams-Taylor, Mary Griffin, Erma Jackson West, Master Gunnery Sgt. Sam Young Jr., Charles Ware, and Staff Sgt. James Luckett opened the school's 151st commencement ceremony at Tiger Stadium. Clad in golden caps and gowns, they crossed the field to resounding cheers from a crowd that welcomed them like returning heroes.

Superintendent Gary P. Hannah, school board chairman Johnny Brown, board members, Principal K.R. Johnson, and faculty greeted the distinguished alumni with applause and congratulations.

"It's difficult to believe that five decades have passed since we marched out onto the grounds of Canton Public High School to receive our high school diplomas, our passport to the future," said Dr. Johnson-Luckett. "It was surpassed only by the excitement on Saturday when we marched again, fifty years later, to receive a golden diploma. We are living the GOLDEN LIFE."

Johnson-Luckett also announced that her foundation, the Marilyn Johnson-Luckett Foundation, Inc., will award five \$500 book scholarships to the Class of 2025.

Her ties to the school run deep. In 1975, Canton High teachers played a basketball game to raise funds for her to attend the Presidential Classroom for Young Americans in Washington, D.C., where she was one of only five African American students among 375 national participants. That experience, she said, helped shape her path toward earning a Ph.D. and MPPA in Public Policy and Administration.

The Class of 1975 continues its legacy by giving back. Members are funding the construction of an outdoor classroom to promote innovative learning and offer fresh-air instruction in STEM, the arts, and other disciplines. Dr. Evans-Bowen, a longtime educator, emphasized the importance of such a space to meet evolving student needs.

In addition, Dr. Williams-Taylor, a psychology graduate of Texas Southern University, highlighted mental health support and announced that Canton High graduates attending Texas Southern may apply for her

existing education endowment.

The celebration included spiritual support from Rev. Robert E. McCallum of Priestley Chapel MB Church, who recognized the "golden marchers" during the baccalaureate service and offered words of encouragement to both the Class of 1975 and the graduating Class of 2025.

Fifty years later, these alumni marched again—not just in honor of the past, but to help shape the future.

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Change air filters. Air filters on some air conditioning units require monthly cleaning or replacing.



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Buy a programmable thermostat. A programmable thermostat can help manage costs, is controllable, and can help monitor usage.



Use fans to cool off. Ceiling fans, box fans and oscillating fans use very little electricity to circulate the air. Make sure ceiling fans are rotating in the right direction – counter-clockwise during summer – to push cooler air down into the room. Be sure to turn all fans off in unused rooms.



Close blinds, shades and curtains to keep the sun out and the cool air in. Also, close air conditioning vents in rooms that are not in use.



Seal cracks and holes around doors, windows and ductwork. Weather stripping and caulk will help keep the cold air in and the hot air out.

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Board of Aldermen reviews financials and upcoming events

The City of Canton Board of Aldermen convened for its regular meet-



ing with Mayor William Truly, Jr., M.D., presiding. The agenda covered a range of municipal matters includfiing

nancial authorizations, community reimbursements, and planning for future events and expenditures.

Presenters for the evening included Andrea Ousley and Iveanna Murry. The board moved forward with the approval of ClaimsContractual Claims Docket, Exhibit "B.

A significant item on the agenda was the authorization of an \$850 reimbursement to Jacqueline James for the rental of the Multipurpose Building, which was affected by rain. Additionally, the board discussed the continuation of disclosure procedures for the City of Canton, referencing the last disclosures completed in June 2024.

Financial planning for upcoming infrastructure needs was a key topic. The board considered a resolution to allocate \$270,000 from the 2025 promissory note into a dedicated account for multipurpose complex repair and \$290,000 into a separate account for a garbage side loader. Another item included approval of the 8038G form for the 2024-2025 Commercial Promissory Note.

Under the consent agenda, the board approved a \$1,000 donation to the Atlanta Division Cantonian Club Gala and supported an inkind donation for Exit 119 Booster Club's use of the Multipurpose Complex on May 29, 2025, for their Annual Athletic Awards Banquet. Further approvals included:

\$4,350 to James Williams for tree removal on Lyon Street and East North Street.

\$175 for Attorney Kimberly

Banks' registration to MMA 2025 through the Mississippi Municipal Attorney's Association.

\$250 to Liberty Exterminating for termite treatment at Fire Station #4. The board then entered Executive Session to discuss personnel matters within the Police Department and Parks & Recreation Depart-ment, as well as other confidential matters including:

Security planning (1 matter), Land transactions (3 matters), Legal strategy and negotiations (3 matters).

The meeting concluded after addressing all scheduled items and executive matters.

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
