# CPSD grades are in

Accountability ratings were recently released for Canton Public School District (CPSD) by the Mississippi Department of Education. Last year, the district saw major improvements in their ratings.

Reuben B. Myers Canton School of Arts and Sciences and Jimmie Goodloe Elementary School maintained A ratings, and Huey Porter Middle School maintained a B rating. Canton High School, which was once the lowest F in the state, achieved B status for the first time, and its 91 percent graduation rate is the school's highest ever. The district also experienced proficiency gains in reading and science across the board, and all four of the elementary schools are rated B or higher.

Superintendent Hannah attributes the district's progress to consistency and focus.

"The Canton Public School District attributes its elementary schools' success to high-quality, student-centered instruction," said Hannah. "Our elementary schools have created learning structures embedded with research-based approaches to teach-

ing and learning. Consequently, those teaching methods have produced positive student learning outcomes in our elementary schools."

"Our high-performing teams of teachers are rising to the challenge each year by using those learning protocols and structures to meet every student's learning needs, whether below grade level, on grade level, or above grade level. And school administrators and teachers are not settling for anything less than the students' absolute best in the classroom," said Hannah.

"Student success begins with setting high expectations and attainable goals," continued Hannah. "Once our students understand that we have high expectations for them and this is your yearly goal, we do our job in helping them reach that goal, but, more importantly, it is an expectation that you will cont. on page 11







life at Ward Lake Hunting Club in Coahoma County, Mississippi.




might enjoy the tales of my adventures," said Crews. Crews has sold books all over the country, Canada, and even Australia and New Zealand.

The purpose of the Student of the Month award program is to connect businesses/industries with students promoting skills needed to fulfill the Madison County workforce.









reach that goal. It is non-negotiable."

The superintendent also gave a nod to the supportive parents throughout the community. "Equally important, our parents collabo-

to a C. The Mississippi Department of Education's Accountability Standards state that if a school or district does not meet an overall 95% testing participation rate, the school or district will automatical-

ly be dropped by one classification level.

Due to the invalidation of scores at Nichols Middle School due to testing irregularities, the district's testing participation rate 92.7%, was which was below the required 95% testing participation rate.

Superintendent Gary Hannah calls the district's automatic downgrade "disappointing," but he is confident that the district will return to its previous rating.

Applications will be accepted through December 3 through mayors in the CMMA area, which includes the counties of Copiah, Hinds, Madison, Rankin, Simpson, Warren and Yazoo.

Scholarships are available to individuals entering any Mississippi university, college or community college in any year (freshman, sophomore, junior or senior) as an undergraduate student. Students may utilize scholarship funds to cover tuition, books or fees only.

Applications are available for download at CMPDD.org/cmma.

Applications must be typed or clearly written. Incomplete or illegible applications will not be consid-

ered, rated or returned. Applications must be received electronically or postmarked no later than 4 p.m. on Sunday, December 31, 2023.

Official high school and/or college transcripts are required, and all community service must be verifiable. Any unverifiable community service will not receive points. No student will be eligible to receive more than one CMMA scholarship

per lifetime.

CMMA will appoint a committee to review applications and assign a rating value to each applica-

tion according to the rating criteria. The top four applicants will be notified and invited to an interview with the appointed committee in late February 2024. \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to two students for the 2024-2025 school year. Scholarship awards will be announced no later than May 1, 2024, for
