



While the initial Merchants' Open House Weekend has concluded, the town square will host several special events throughout December. The Singalong Fest with the Best and Photos with Santa (at 137 West Peace Street) will return, running December 5-7, and again from December 12-23. Similarly, horse-drawn carriage rides around the Historic Square will be offered Friday and Saturday, December 5 and 6, as well as from December 12-23. Another event Cantonians are encouraged to mark their calendars for is the 19th Annual Holiday Sip 'N Cider on December 12, from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m., where participating merchants will offer warm cider and host competitions.

Access to many attractions requires tickets. Individual tickets cost \$2, but guests can purchase a sheet of 25 tickets for \$25. Rides like the fire truck, carousel, Sky Race, and antique cars require 2 tickets each, while the wagon train requires 3 tickets. The horsedrawn carriage rides and Christmas Village require 5 tickets per person. Attendees are reminded that only cash or major credit cards are accepted, and all ticket sales are final. 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
Letter from the editor: Millennials are slowing life down

Way back when: Howes' Great London Circus

The days before the holidays often hold a magic of their own. The anticipation, the preparation, and the traveling - these moments are heightened by the sense of something special on the horizon.

A century-and-a-half ago, that period of excitement included the Largest Show Upon Earth: Howes' Great London Circus, which visited 'Canton, Canton, Canton' on Monday, November 22, 1875. The ONLY First-Class BIG SHOW Ever South!!

The show's arrival was nothing short of a spectacle. Billed as '100 times more grand' and boasting a staggering \$1.5 million capital investment, the circus promised wonders from every corner of the globe. Audiences marveled at Howes' Great London Circus and Grecian Hippodrome, Sanger's English Menagerie with its thirty cages and dens of wild animals, extraordinary acrobatic pyramids from the renowned Iroquois Indian Troupe, and dazzling equestrian performances.

The show featured exotic beasts, African lion acts, a magnificent wardrobe display, trained animal exhibitions,

and a full menagerie transported exclusively by railroad.

For one remarkable day, Canton was home to a world of marvels—10,000 wonders of earth, sea, and skywrapped in music, color, and spectacle.

It was the kind of excitement that lit up the season.

Today, the Canton Square glows from Thanksgiving through Christmas, keeping that holiday magic ready whenever you are.



First graders bring book characters to life with pumpkin project





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

Clubs and casual gatherings are popping up everywhere, drawing new players of all ages who appreciate the game's blend of strategy, luck and face-to-face interaction.

The game, which involves drawing and discarding tiles to form sets, offers a welcome break from digital screens. There is also a beauty in mahjong in regards to the etiquette of the game. While many find it intimidating, as learning the tiles, the suits, and the rules can be a bit overwhelming, the beauty of the game is the lack of competitive nature. In a world where we are all focused on winning and being the best, mahjong focuses on celebrating everyone's wins and working together, even as you attempt to create your own mahjong match.

Beyond its social appeal, mahjong has also proved to be an effective tool for philanthropy. Many groups and enthusiasts have successfully leveraged the game's popularity to host fundraiser events for various charities, turning a fun game night into a community giving night. The combination of its strategic challenge and the inherent social nature of playing with a group has solidified mahjong's place as the latest "it" hobby

Mahjong came to America in the early 1920s and was first popularized by a white American entrepreneur in China, Joseph Park Babcock. It saw a boom in popularity in the 1920s, but later faced a decline until it experienced a renaissance after World War II, largely driven by Jewish American women who played it to build social networks.

Madison County specifically has seen a huge uptick in mahjong, as many moms are meeting for after school events, church events and more. Classes have also become more popular, and some, like Ménage à Mahj, offer hour-long classes to beginner learners. 


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also hosts Mississippi Mahj Club, an opportunity to find events in the area and make new friends.

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
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Canton Career Center celebrates Wayne Day as Teacher of the Year





How to help prevent home christmas tree fires

For all the joy and beauty Christmas trees bring, it's important to remember that they are large combustible items that present potential fire hazards in the home. This blog provides an overview of home Christmas tree fires and tips from National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) to help you stay safer this holiday season.

How common are Christmas tree fires?

Between 2018 and 2022, fire departments in the United States responded to an annual average of 155 home structure fires caused by Christmas trees. On average, these fires resulted in four civilian deaths, seven civilian injuries, and \$15 million in direct property damage each year. NFPA data indicates that fires involving fresh Christmas trees tend to be more common than artificial tree fires.

Overall, home Christmas tree fires don't

happen often—fires involving candles happen roughly 38 times more frequently in the U.S., for comparison—but when Christmas tree fires do occur, especially involving fresh Christmas trees, they're likely to be serious. That's in part because fresh Christmas trees dry out over time, making them more flammable the longer they're in the home. A dried-out Christmas tree will burn much more quickly than a well-watered one.

What causes Christmas tree fires?

According to the latest statistics from NFPA, lighting and electrical equipment cause most Christmas tree fires in the home. According to the research:

- Electrical distribution or lighting equipment was involved in more than two in five (41 percent) home Christmas tree fires.
- One in five (20 percent) home Christmas tree fires were started by lamps or bulbs.

- More than one in 10 (11 percent) home Christmas tree fires were started by candles.
- Two in five (40 percent) home Christmas tree fires started in the living room.

Tips for staying safer

NFPA offers a number of safety tips to help you stay safer while picking, putting up, decorating, and disposing of a Christmas tree, including:


- mas tree, including:

 Test a fresh Christmas tree before purchasing it by running your hands along one of its branches. If you end up with more than a few needles, it's a sign that the tree may be too dry.
- After selecting a fresh tree, cut 2 inches (5 cm) from the base of the trunk before placing it in the stand. Add water daily to keep the tree well hydrated.
- Trees should be placed at least 3 feet (1 m) away from any heat source,

- such as fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
 - Ensure that decorative Christmas tree lights are in good working order and used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, keeping in mind that some lights are designed for indoor or outdoor use only, while others can be used for both.
 - When purchasing new Christmas tree lights, make sure they bear the mark of an independent, qualified testing laboratory, which ensures that the product has been tested to meet established safety standards.

After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage or placed outside against the home.
