As the autumn leaves start to fall and the holidays approach, there is no better time to appreciate the small-town charm and big-city history that make Canton a truly special place to live. Our community is rich with unique history, cinematic fame and treasured traditions.

The Canton News is sharing ten reasons why we are thankful for Canton this season:

Owe: The Movie Capital of Mississippi. Our quaint, picturesque streets and historic square have long captured Hollywood's attention. Canton has served as the filming location for five major feature films, earning us the proud nickname, "The Movie Capital of

Mississippi."

Two: The National Register
Historic District. The Canton Courthouse Square Historic District, surrounding our beautiful Greek Revival courthouse built in 1855, was entered into the National Register of Historic Places in 1982. It is considered one of the three best examples of its kind in the state.

Three: The World-Famous Flea Market. Twice a year, our downtown square transforms into the nationally-famous Canton Flea Market Arts and Crafts Show. The market, which started modestly in 1965, now attracts up to one hundred thousand visitors annually, making it one of the largest outdoor craft markets in the South.

Four: The Bright Lights of Christmas. Canton celebrates the holiday season with the spectacular Victorian Christmas Festival, also known as the "City of Lights." The monthlong festival transforms the square with thousands of twinkling lights and festive displays, drawing visitors from across the region.

Five: A Cradle of Art. Canton is the birthplace of the Mississippi Art Colony, which holds the distinction of being the oldest continuous, self-governed art colony in the country. Its legacy is documented at the Smithsonian Institute.

Six: Our Architectural Gem. The Madison County Courthouse, built in 1855, remains one of only seven pre-Civil War courthouses in Mississippi that is in an unaltered condition. Its Georgian architecture and large dome (twice protected from removal by the insistence of local women) stand as a centerpiece of local history.

Seven: The Historic Old Jail. The Old Madison County Jail, constructed in 1870, served the county for 99 years and is also listed on the National Register of Historic Places, preserving a unique part of local law enforcement history.

Eight: The Blues Trail Con-

nection. Music lovers can celebrate our connection to the rich musical legacy of the state. Canton is part of the famed Mississippi Blues Trail, celebrating the area's contributions to the genre, including its ties to blues legend Elmore James.

Nine: Community and Commerce. Home to major facilities like the Nissan assembly plant, Canton enjoys the best of both worlds: small-town charm with access to modern industry, providing economic opportunity within a close-knit community setting.

Ten: A Place for All Stories. The Canton Multicultural Center and Museum provides a dedicated space focusing on the life and struggles of African Americans in Canton and Madison County, ensuring the diverse heritage and pivotal role of the Civil Rights movement in our area are remembered and celebrated.



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

- Allow the aroma to fill vour home for several hours, adjusting ingredients for strength and sweetness.

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


# Luckett inducted into Phi Theta Kappa





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# Way back when: Canton dome protected by local women





Students at Canton High School (The large dome atop a local building, measuring twenty feet in diameter and thirty feet high, has twice faced threats of removal for security reasons, according to the Canton-Madison County Historic Soci-

ety.

The first removal attempt occurred during the structure's original construction in 1856, and the second during remodeling efforts in 1925. In both instances, women in the town successfully protected the dome by insisting that "beauty prevail over reason."














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### Luckett named to State Superintendent Student Advisory Council



Keep an eye on downtown Canton and start planning your visit soon — it's almost time for the lights to switch on.





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

# Canton Aldermen consider key appointments and moratoriums on tiny homes, resort venues

The Canton Mayor and Board of Aldermen/Alderwomen met on Tuesday, October 7, 2025, to consider a significant agenda that included key administrative appointments, new resolutions to pause certain developments, and updates to solid waste management fees. Mayor Tim C. Taylor presided over the meeting, with Alderwomen Cynthia Allen, Monica Gilkey, and Janice Diamond, as well as Alderman Les Penn, present. Alderman Rodriquez Brown, Alderwoman Dr. Shannon Whitehead, and Alderman Lafayette E. Wales were listed as absent.

The Board approved a slate of top administrative appointments, ensuring critical city leadership roles are filled. These appointments included Dr. Chuconna Anderson as City Clerk, Otha Brown as Chief of Police, and Howard Brown as Prosecuting Attorney. Additionally, the Board approved the appointments of Kamesha Mumford and Stacey Weem as Municipal Judges.

A central focus of the meetings was the review of two resolutions proposing temporary moratoriums on specific types of development, reflecting the Board's intent to pause certain development while new ordinances are finalized to guide future growth. First, the Board considered a resolution establishing a six-month moratorium on all Tiny Home placements, building permits, and applications for special exceptions. This pause is intended to last until the city's Unified Development Code (UDC) can be officially amended and published to properly address and regulate this emerging type

of housing. The UDC is a single, comprehensive document that combines all of the city's zoning, subdivision, and site development regulations to make the planning process clearer. Second, a 60-day moratorium on permits for new venues, restaurants, and hotels that sell alcoholic beverages was reviewed. This temporary freeze is specifically for businesses subject to the proposed ordinances within the city's Qualified Resort Area (QRA). This moratorium ensures that all new permit applications align with the new QRA rules, a designation that is a major deal for the city's economy as it permits alcoholic beverage sales in certain establishments, boosting tourism and economic

In other policy and finance matters, the Board approved the ordinance establishing a formal procedure for renaming streets, public facilities, and creating honorary street namings, along with the corresponding application forms. The Board also reviewed an amended ordinance to establish new residential and commercial garbage collection fees, and considered related forms for acquiring an additional garbage cart and requesting door-to-door household waste pickup. Furthermore, the Board considered an approval to re-bid on the Canton multipurpose roof complex.

Infrastructure and contractual matters were also addressed. The Board authorized three task orders for Waggoner Engineering, covering support for building permit plan review, enhancements to the interactive zoning application, and maintenance for the City's GIS Zoning Map. Additionally, an

agreement with Franklin Engineering & Consultant for stand-by engineering and consulting services and a proposal for 2026 air compliance assistance were listed on the agenda for approval. Financial oversight included the approval of the standard claims, contractual claims, and payroll dockets, and the consideration of an application for a tax anticipation loan. The agenda also included the planned approval of a Section 8 Operating Plan and Financial Assurances regarding a Landfill Solid Waste Permit Application to the

Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ).

The meeting concluded with an Executive Session to discuss 15 personnel matters across six departments—Supervision & Finance, Parks & Recreation, Police, Fire, Building & Zoning, and Public Works. Additional matters scheduled for discussion in the closed session included strategy sessions regarding prospective litigation, one investigative proceeding, and three matters concerning land transactions.

# Canton launches survey to build a safer, more connected future

The City of Canton recently launched a major public outreach effort, inviting every resident to help design the city's next transportation plan. The initiative, a partnership with Waggoner Engineering, is designed to create safer streets, better sidewalks, and improved connectivity across Canton.

City officials emphasized that the success of the plan hinges entirely on local knowledge. By sharing their experiences, residents will directly inform decisions regarding infrastructure improvements, ensuring the future transportation system meets the community's needs.

The public input survey will run from October 2025 through December 2025. The anonymous survey is expected to take approximately ten minutes to complete and is built to gather both demographic context (such as age and

connection to Canton) and specific commuting habits.

Shaping Canton's Infrastructure The questionnaire asks for detailed feedback on daily travel, safety and future challenges. Residents are encouraged to report on:

- Commuting Habits: Identifying their primary mode of transportation and average daily commute time.
- Traffic Hotspots: Pinpointing where they experience the worst traffic or delays during peak hours (7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.).
- Safety and Walkability: Noting if there are road segments or areas they avoid for safety concerns, and whether there are enough sidewalks where they travel.
- Future Vision: Sharing what improvements would encourage them to bike more and what they believe will be the big-

gest transportation challenge for Canton in the next ten to twenty years.

Officials stated that the data gathered will ensure the resulting Transportation Plan is not just a study, but a road-

map that makes Canton safer, more connected, and better prepared for future growth.


