
I absolutely love December! Not only is it Christmas season, but it's book awards! All over we get to see the best books of 2025.


The Booker Prize was awarded to David Szalay's novel, *Flesh*, a hypnotic story that follows the life of

an emotionally detached man, providing a spare yet powerful picture of modern masculinity and the impact of lingering trauma.


Percival Everett's *James* took home the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, earning praise as a brilliant, action-packed re-

For its emotional depth, Yael van der Wouden's debut novel, *The Safekeep*, won the Women's Prize for Fiction for its intimate and un-


settling exploration of repressed desire and historical amnesia in the aftermath of World War II.

In fantasy, the Hugo Award for Best Novel went to Robert Jackson Bennett's *The Tainted Cup*, a brilliant and imaginative mystery set in a fantastical world where a detective must solve a terrifying locked-room murder by blending epic fantasy with a compelling whodunit structure.



In the realm of children's literature, the American Library Association announced its most prestigious

awards. The John Newbery Medal for the most distinguished contribution



to children's literature was awarded to Erin Entrada Kelly for her novel, *The First State of Being*. This compelling speculative fiction story, set in 1999, follows a lonely boy who befriends a teenager who claims to be a time traveler from 200 years in the future, grounding its mind-bending concepts with real relationships and a major problem to solve.

The Randolph Caldecott Medal for the most distin-




guished American picture book was awarded to Rebecca Lee Kunz (illustrator) and Andrea L. Rogers (author) for *Chooch Helped*. This warm, loving family story, featuring dynamic mixed-media illustrations, is told by an older sister who is struggling to be patient with her two-year-old Cherokee Nation little brother, Chooch, who always wants to "help."

Finally, the National Book Award for Fiction was claimed by Rabih Alameddine for *The True True Story of Raja the Gullible (and His Mother)*, a darkly comic saga spanning six decades in the life of a Lebanese family, while


Fredrik Backman's *My Friends* won the Goodreads Choice Award for Fiction for its heartbreak, humorous, and profoundly human exploration

of the redemptive power of art and the ache of adolescence. Not that anyone asked, but I'll tell you about *Atmosphere*, anyway. It actually

won the Goodreads Choice Award for Historical Fiction! It's set in the 1980s and is all about one of the first women scientists selected for NASA's space shuttle program, Joan Goodwin, and how she unexpectedly falls for a fellow astronaut candidate, Vanessa Ford, while they train. It's a total emotional roller-coaster, seriously thrilling, and also such a beautiful, tender love story amidst all the high-stakes astronaut drama—I literally couldn't put it down.



Board of Education seeks high school sophomores as representatives

The Mississippi State Board of Education (SBE) is seeking applications from high school sophomores to serve as the new high school junior student representative on the SBE for the 2026-27 school year. The application deadline is January 30, 2026.

Now in its eighth year, the Student Representatives of the Mississippi State Board of Education program includes a high school junior and a high school senior who serve as non-voting

SBE members to share their viewpoints on policy decisions regarding Mississippi public schools.

The current SBE junior representative, Michelle Xie of Oak Grove High School, will serve as the senior representative in 2026-27. Through a competitive process, the SBE will appoint a new junior representative to serve a two-year term starting July 1, 2026.

The top ten semi-finalists among applicants, including the junior representative appointed and an alternate

representative, automatically get to serve on the State Superintendent's Student Advisory Council. There were thirty students who were eligible applicants for the 2025-26 junior representative position.

The SBE adopted policy in 2018 outlining criteria for adding student representatives to the State Board. Student representatives are responsible for attending monthly SBE meetings and any standing committees or subcommittees to which they are assigned. They are excused from school to attend SBE meetings as official school

business, and they also work as liaisons for their peers to SBE.

The application packet must be mailed and postmarked by January 30, 2026, and a video component of the application must be uploaded that day by 5 p.m. To access the application, visit MDEK12.org/mbe/Student-Representatives-Of-The-Mississippi-State-Board-Of-Education/. Historical Society hosts Open House at Canton's Old Jail

The Canton-Madison County Historical Society held its annual Christmas Open House at the historic Old Jail in December, welcoming families and visitors to celebrate the holiday season in the community space.

The event, titled "Christmas at the Old Jail," took place over three days at the jail, located at 234 East Fulton Street.

The Historical Society warmly invited the public to see the building lit up for the holiday, enjoy light refreshments, and meet new friends. Visitors were encouraged to stop by while in town seeing the Christmas lights on the Canton Square.

The Old Madison County Jail is recognized as one of the best-preserved 19th-century penal facilities still existing in Mississippi. The two-story brick structure was erected between 1870 and 1871 and is significant as an example of post-Civil War architecture.

The building has an interesting contrast, with the front section designed as a residential space for the jailer and his family, and the ominous cell block located to the rear.

The jail served the county for 99

years, operating until 1969. It was individually listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979. Today, the building serves as the headquarters for the Canton-Madison County Historical Society.

Waters named ASA executive director



Prepare for the Cold: NWS cold weather safety tips for Canton residents

A familiar, rhythmic clicking sound As January approaches, typically bringing with it the coldest temperatures of the year, Canton residents are urged to prepare for potential cold snaps. The National Weather Service (NWS) provides essential safety tips, especially for vulnerable populations and pets, to help the community stay safe and warm.

Historically, January is the coldest month in Canton. Average daily high temperatures hover around 57°F, but lows typically drop to about 38°F. Overnight temperatures can, on occasion, fall well below freezing, posing risks to people, pets and property.

Build Your Winter Home Emergency Kit

The NWS recommends having a three-day supply of essential items to prepare for potential power loss or being unable to leave your home:

- Water: At least one gallon per person, per day.
- Food: Non-perishable food that requires no cooking, such as canned goods and energy bars. Include a non-electric can opener if

necessary.

- Warmth: One blanket or sleeping bag per person, and an extra change of warm clothing.
- Light/Communication: A flashlight with extra batteries, and a battery-powered NOAA Weather Radio.
- Medical: A first aid kit and any essential prescription medicines.
- Other Needs: Items for infants, elderly, or disabled family members, and cash.

Key Safety Tips for Everyone

The NWS emphasizes taking precautions to avoid hypothermia and protect your home:

- Layer Up: Wear several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing rather than one heavy layer. Cover your head with a hat, and wear mittens instead of gloves for better warmth.
- Stay Indoors: Limit time outdoors during the coldest periods.
- Check Pipes: To prevent freezing, insulate exposed pipes, disconnect outdoor hoses, and open cabinet doors under sinks to allow warm air to reach the plumbing.
- Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poi-

soning: Never use a gas oven to heat your home. Ensure fireplaces, wood stoves, and portable heaters are properly vented. Never run a generator inside a home, garage, or even near windows.

- Check Detectors: Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Special Tips for the Elderly and Vulnerable

Older adults are among the most susceptible to extreme cold and are at higher risk of developing hypothermia, which can happen when the body's temperature drops below 95°F.

- Stay Connected: Check on elderly family members, friends, and neighbors frequently. Ensure they have adequate heat and necessary supplies.
- Dress Warmly Indoors: Encourage them to wear layers of clothing and a hat, even inside, to retain body heat.
- Stay Dry: Wet clothing should be removed immediately to prevent a dangerous drop in body temperature.
- Maintain Heat: Keep the thermostat set no lower than 55°F to help

prevent pipes from freezing and maintain a safe indoor temperature.

Protecting Your Pets


Even with a natural coat, pets are vulnerable to freezing temperatures and should be kept safe and warm.

- Bring Pets Indoors: Keep your pets inside as much as possible, especially at night or when temperatures drop below freezing.

- Provide Shelter: If animals must be outside for short periods, ensure they have access to a dry, draft-free, appropriately sized shelter with clean, dry bedding.

- Food and Water: Ensure food and water are accessible and do not freeze. Dehydration is a major risk in cold weather.

- Wipe Paws: Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach after walks in sleet or ice, as they can ingest salt or harmful chemicals while licking their paws.

ingredients

MadCAAP's B.A.S.E. Camp blends holiday spirit with creative learning



Canton Board of Aldermen tackles infrastructure and public safety

The Canton Board of Aldermen convened for two regular meetings in December 2025 to address a range of municipal priorities, from drainage improvements to landfill expansions and holiday observances. Mayor Tim C. Taylor presided over the sessions held at Canton City Hall on Dec. 2 and Dec. 16, where city leaders moved forward on several multi-million dollar projects.

During the Dec. 2 meeting, the board focused heavily on public works and city planning. Members approved the final pay request and contract close-out documents for the City of Canton Drainage Improvements Project, certifying the final completion of the work performed by R&C Services. The

board also reviewed and conditioned a site plan for a Yates Construction Company staging yard and a conditional use exception for a youth baseball and softball training center on Highway 51 South. In

preparation for the coming year, officials formally adopted the City of Canton's 2026 holiday calendar and discussed the 2026-2027 fire protection service contract with the Madison County Fire Protection District.

The mid-month session on Dec. 16 saw significant movement on landfill operations and city infrastructure.

The board considered a resolution to authorize a \$13 million loan from the Mississippi Development Bank for Subtitle D landfill expansion and solid waste improvements. Related

landfill actions included the approval of an equipment rental agreement for a waste handling dozer and a payment to Think Creative Intelligence for garbage

collection decals. Public safety also remained a priority, as the board accepted a \$196,500 check from the Madison County Board of Supervisors specifically to restore and modernize the city's tornado warning system.

Additional municipal business included the approval of \$30,000 for roof repairs at the Multipurpose Complex and authorizing the advertisement of the city's upcoming Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration scheduled for Jan. 19, 2026. The board also navigated complex local policy by considering a resolution to opt out of the Safe Solicitation Act, a move recently mirrored by several other Mississippi municipalities. Both meetings concluded with executive sessions to discuss personnel matters, prospective litigation, and the potential purchase or sale of land.
