As state champions, the Tiger Tycoons have earned the opportunity



to represent Mississippi at the national competition, which will be held in Atlanta in June 2025. The event brings together top teams from across the United States to compete in financial literacy challenges at the national level. Reviving a beacon of Canton's Past: Harreld Chevrolet Sign

For over eight decades, Harreld Chevrolet stood as a beacon of smalltown resilience and community pride in Canton, Mississippi. From its humble beginnings on West Peace Street in 1932, to the iconic neon glow of its Highway 51 location, the dealership built by W.E. Harreld, Sr. etched itself into the hearts of generations. Now, almost a decade after the Harreld family sold the business, the spirit of the dealership is set to shine again—literally.

On Friday, March 28, the Rose Garden Room at the Canton Welcome Center buzzed with excitement as master neon artisan Rene Pastor of Magic City Signs captivated the crowd with "All About Neon," a vibrant presentation on the history and artistry of neon signage. The event marked more than just a nostalgic look back—it was the kickoff of a community-led effort to restore the legendary Harreld Chevrolet neon sign that has towered over Highway 51 since 1947.

"It was the largest neon sign in Mississippi at the time," said Canton historian Jim Lacey, Jr., referencing the glowing landmark that once welcomed travelers from Chicago to New Orleans. "People would compare the big Harreld sign to the one atop the Peabody Hotel in Memphis."

The fundraiser, hosted by Canton Tourism and spearheaded by the Canton-Madison County Historical So-



ciety, seeks to return the sign to its former brilliance. If successful, Pastor and his team from Birmingham, Alabama will begin the restoration. Known for their work on HGTV's *Home Town*, Magic City Signs brings the experience and artistic vision needed to honor the sign's legacy.


The Harreld Chevrolet story is a cornerstone of Canton's history. Founded during the Great Depression, the business weathered national crises including labor strikes, gas shortages, and even the 1979 Easter Flood. In 1947, moving to a swampy plot just south of the town square seemed risky. But with a philosophy grounded in putting the customer first, the dealership flourished under three generations of Harreld leadership—W.E. Harreld, Sr., his son Bill Jr., and later, his grandson Jim.

Even as car dealerships grew larger and more corporate, Harreld Chevrolet retained its small-town charm. Loyal customers from Canton and the surrounding counties remained steadfast, drawn to the family's unwavering commitment to service and community.

Though the dealership was sold to Mac Haik in 2016, the legacy remains—in stories, in memories, and in the silent silhouette of its once-vibrant sign. Now, nearly 90 years after W.E. Harreld first opened his doors, Canton is rallying once again to preserve a piece of its identity.

"Neon is more than just light—it's history, it's emotion," said Pastor during his presentation. Four grandchildren of the original sign's creator, Billy Will Harreld, were in attendance, their presence a living bridge between past and future.

As Canton eyes its 2036 Bicentennial, restoring the Harreld Chevrolet sign is more than a beautification project—it's a symbol of the city's enduring spirit. In the words of one attendee: "It's about lighting up our past to illuminate our future."

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

displayed at The Old Jail Museum, which serves as a historical archive for the city and Madison County. The museum is operated by the Canton-Madison County Historical Preservation So-


ciety and is dedicated to preserving and sharing the region's cultural and civic heritage.

Brown named Canton High School STAR Student

Canton High School has announced Kenyatta Brown as its 2025 STAR Student and Mrs. Aleatrice Liddell as its STAR Teacher. Both individuals are being recognized as part of the Student-Teacher Achievement Recognition (STAR) Program, which is administered by the Mississippi Economic Council (MEC).

The STAR Student program acknowl-edges Mississippi high school seniors who have demonstrated academic excellence and ACT test achievement. To be eligible, students must be regularly enrolled seniors or approved dually enrolled students in accredited public or private high schools or post-secondary institutions. Candidates must be completing their final year of high school, be eligible to graduate in the current academic year, and meet a minimum ACT composite score of 25. Additionally, they must have an overall academic average of 93 or above in selected core subjects-English, mathematics, science, social studies and foreign language-taken in the ninth, tenth, eleventh and first semester of twelfth grade. Selection of the STAR Student is based on the highest ACT score earned by December 31 of the year prior to the Education Celebration. If more than one student meets the minimum criteria and



scores a composite ACT of 35 or higher, each is eligible to be designated as a STAR Student. Upon designation, the STAR Student selects a STAR Teacher—an educator the student believes has made the most significant contribution to their academic achievement. Brown selected Mrs. Aleatrice Liddell for this honor.

STAR Students and STAR Teachers must be U.S. Citizens or lawful permanent residents and Mississippi residents to be eligible for recognition and any scholarship opportunities associated with the program. While the STAR program itself does not directly award scholarships, eligible students may be considered for awards through external organizations such as the Kelly Gene Cook, Sr. Charitable Foundation, Inc

Both honorees will be recognized at the Mississippi Economic Council's annual Education Celebration, where all STAR Students and STAR Teachers across the state receive certificates. The

event highlights academic accomplishments and acknowledges the role educators play in student success.





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CPSD recognizes PREPS award winners

After the official tour, members roamed the grounds, appreciating the phlox, clematis, iris, roses and many other blooms crowding the garden. Of particular historical note were the



coming the return of longtime educator and coach Ben Williams to the Panther basketball court for the 2025 season.


Coach Williams will resume his role as head coach for both junior high and varsity girls' basketball teams roles he has held at various points over his nearly thirty-year coaching career


