Canton rolls out the red carpet for The Girl in the River

Hollywood returns to Canton with a star-studded cast and major economic impact.

Canton, Mississippi, is once again in the spotlight as *The Girl in the River* begins filming in the historic city. Known for its cinematic legacy, Canton has long been a premier filming location in the state.

Mayor Tim Taylor welcomed the cast and crew to the city. "We are proud that Canton continues to attract major productions, and we thank the filmmakers for choosing our community," he said.

Gordon added, "The crew has been absolutely the most professional group of individuals and has treated Canton with such great respect and care. The continued presence of noted actors and actresses in our


community is a compliment to the people of Canton, Madison County, and Mississippi. Our locals go out of their way to welcome these celebrities with true hospitality and charm."

Letter from the Editor: Support your local library

When I was young, we lived in a super small town in Georgia. My mom was a stay-at-home mom, also lovingly known as a stay-in-my-business mom. She was all about all the things. Because of this, my brothers and I were never bored. She drove the church van, the soccer van, she subbed at our school, she ran VBS, and she also always supported the local library.

The Hightower Memorial Library was a place of magic. It was absolutely huge-a brick building that sat on a hill with giant white columns and large windows letting in plenty of sunlight. I remember walking through the stacks and through the sunlight, watching the dust dance when I finally found a good spot on

Looking back, taking us to the library was probably a great way for mom to get a little rest, peace and quiet from the three of us. But those were some of my favorite days.

The library was divided into two sections. The left side was children, and the right side was adults. I used to feel like such a rebel, quite the grown up, when I walked over to the adult section to sort through the titles. Mom sat at a central table with my youngest brother and read while

our libraries and bookstores to begin with! All because they wanted to ensure everyone had something to read, no matter their age. Libraries are the reason that people with learning

differences have the ability to listen to audiobooks for free. And some libraries, most libraries, give readers a soft place to land when they're lonely need a break. When they're a new mom desperate for

interaction but too scared to go anywhere in public, so they stroll their newborn block down the way and walk into the library, taking the first breath real they've taken since the birth of that

newborn.

But Courtney, you say, I don't read. What do I need the library for? Libraries, at their core, are about social equity. Everyone is the same in the library. Everyone matters. Everyone is on an even playing field. Where else can you find that? In the Bible Belt we'd love to say "church!" as our imm

ediate answer...but are all churches like this? I wish they were.

What do you need the library for? Did you know that a lot of teacher professional development is funded by our libraries? In the 2024 fiscal year, the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) awarded about \$270 million in grants to museums, libraries and states funding that supports statewide databases, interlibrary loans and other resources that impact K-12 schools. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) grants have often gone to teacher professional development workshops run by museums and non-

profit institutions. Now, you may not be able to name your favorite library to support, but I bet you can name a teacher that impacted you.

Thank a library. Support your library.

Go check out a book. You know I always have some to recommend.

I still love the library. I love the way the books smell, I love the way the pages turn, I love the way the plastic crinkles on the hardbacks. Did you know Lemuria sometimes sells books with the crinkly library plastic? I will buy one sometimes for solely that rea-

When Berit and I moved here, the first place we sought out was the library. I didn't know anything and felt so lonely, but I knew without a shadow of a doubt that I would be able to find peace within those stacks. I'd feel at home while she played with the train sets and the picture books. I could take a deep breath.

I will never forget the day she got her first library card. She was a few months short of the age requirement, from reading books."

We walked out that day with a handful of books and now check them out

As I'm sure you know, our libraries are underfunded. With recent changes in D.C., that has become even more apparent. Some libraries are the only place people have access to the internet, to fax machines, to copiers. Some libraries are the only way senior citizens get opportunities to socialize. Some libraries - and librarians - are the only reason children are off of the streets and not getting into trouble.

Did you know that the entire genre of young adult literature was started by librarians? It's true! Give Anne Carroll Moore and Maragret Scoggins a Google. They are the reason we even have those sections and genres in












Historic spotlight: Grace Episcopal Church oldest in Canton

Rich history. Bright future

The City of Canton's Mayor and Board of Aldermen/Alderwoman held their regular meeting on Tuesday, August 5, 2025, at Canton City Hall. Mayor Tim C. Taylor called the meeting to order, followed by an invocation from Pastor John Woodard. Roll call was then taken for the mayor and board members: Alderman Rodriguez Brown, Alderwoman Dr. Shannon Whitehead, Alderman Les Penn, Alderwoman Cynthia Allen, Alderwoman Janice Diamond, Alderwoman Monica Gilkey and Alderman Lafayette E. Wales were present.

The board welcomed presenters Jeff Goodwin and G.A. Carmichael before moving into official business.

Among the conitems sidered were the approval of claims, the minutes from the July 15 meeting, and a payment of \$27,893.75 to Pinnacle

Construction Group from modernization funds for the South Madison Street Project.

The board also discussed policies and purchases related to a Fleet 3rd Eye Camera System, approving the acquisition of new equipment for garbage and boom trucks. In addition, members considered a usage agreement between the City of Canton and The Girl in the River, reviewed an amended fireworks ordinance, and looked at a proposal for grass cutting and beautification. Other matters included an appointment for CMU's election commissioner and authorizing changes to the Unified Development Codes for Canton.

Several significant payments and authorizations were approved. The board approved a \$223,252.14 payment to R&C Services for Canton Drainage Improvement Phase A, covering work completed between April 1 and June 30, to be paid with MCWI funds. They also approved a reimbursement of \$85.56 to Melon Garrett

for an emergency landfill purchase. Proposals from Franklin Engineers and Consultants were authorized to provide both ongoing engineering services for 2025–2026 and air compliance assistance for the landfill in

The City also accepted project closeout documents for several major infrastructure efforts, including the Parker Street and Barfield Street Improvements, Soldiers Colony Road Improvements, South Madison Street Drainage Improvements, and Canton Drainage Improvements. Additionally, Waggoner Engineering was authorized to draft a task order for repairs on Cisne Avenue and Katherine Drive, while Canton Paving, LLC received

approval to lower speed bumps Lu-Martin King ther Singleand ton Street at a cost of \$5,400.

consent agen-

da involved the transfer of several funds. These included \$41,394.03 from general funds to sinking funds, \$852,365 from sinking funds to general funds, and \$26,200 from sinking funds to general funds. The board also approved transferring \$273,415.19 from general funds to modernization and passed a resolution regarding the transfer of Modernization Act Funds.

The meeting concluded with an executive session covering matters related to supervision and finance, parks and recreation, litigation, and land transactions. Six matters were discussed under supervision and finance, including cases of extraordinary emergency and issues involving security planning. The Parks and Recreation/ Public Works Department addressed three personnel-related matters, while seven litigation issues and two matters concerning the sale and lease of lands were also considered.

The next regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen/Alderwoman will take place at Canton City Hall.







Looking for a slow cooker dinner that's rich, cheesy, and full of flavor? This Mississippi chicken spaghetti is buttery to the max, with a tangy kick from pepperoncini peppers. Perfect for family night or a potluck.

Stick of Butter Mississippi Chicken Spaghetti



INGREDIENTS

2 pounds skinless, boneless chicken breasts
1 (1-ounce) packet au jus mix
1 (1-ounce) packet ranch seasoning mix
12 jarred pepperoncini peppers, divided, or more to taste
1/4 cup pepperoncini brine
1 stick butter
8 ounces cream cheese
1 pound spaghetti

8 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, shredded
1/4 cup sliced green onions

PREPARATION

- 1. Place chicken breasts in the bottom of a slow cooker. Sprinkle with au jus and ranch mixes. Add 6 peppers, the brine, and butter. Cover and cook on high for 2 hours 15 minutes.
- 2. Add cream cheese, cover, and continue to cook while you prepare pasta.
- 3. Cook spaghetti in salted boiling water for 9 minutes. Reserve 1/2 cup pasta water and drain.
- 4. Shred chicken into bite-sized pieces. Chop peppers and return everything to the slow cooker. Stir until creamy.
- 5. Mix in pasta, pasta water, and 1 cup cheese. Stir well. Top with remaining cheese, cover, and let melt 5–10 minutes.
- 6. Garnish with green onions and serve.

Tip: This dish reheats beautifully and makes enough to feed a crowd.


Canton Academy added alumnus Yancey Odom to its football coaching staff ahead of the Panthers' first varsity home game.





















MSDH Launches "Protect & Prepare: A Grandparent's Guide"

Vaccines Save Lives

Get vaccinated against whooping cough (pertussis), flu and COVID-19 to protect babies who are too young to be vaccinated. With the rise in pertussis cases this year, it's more important than ever that grandparents and others who come into close contact with the child get vaccinations and booster shots to ensure they don't unknowingly pass the disease on to them.

Though most adults received vaccinations against pertussis in child-hood, immunity wanes over time.

Even healthy adults can unknowingly spread dangerous respiratory infections like pertussis and RSV to infants, who are more susceptible to

health complications, including death. MSDH County Health Departments offer free vaccinations for those whose insurance does not cover it. Call (855) 767-0710 or visit https://msdh.ms.gov/pertussis to schedule an appointment.

Safe Sleep Saves Lives

Though putting infants to sleep on their stomachs was once a common practice, we now know it increases the likelihood of sleep-related death. In Mississippi, sleep-related deaths are the third-leading cause of infant death, and about 1 in 5 sleep-related deaths occur while an infant is being cared for by someone other than a parent

- · Put babies to sleep alone, on their backs, in a crib every nap, every night.
- Don't put pillows, blankets, bumpers, or stuffed animals in their cribs.



"Our employees are proud to



Science lab helps Canton Academy students build ACT skills

Students in Coach Moseley's Advanced Biology class at Canton Academy recently put their scientific skills to the test during the Biological Buffers Lab, a hands-on experiment designed to reinforce classroom learning.

During the lab, students explored the properties of acids, bases and buffers

by testing the pH levels of several substances, including Alka-Seltzer, egg whites and liver. Using pH indicators, they measured how acidic or basic each sample was before introducing hydrochloric acid and sodium hydroxide to observe the changes.

The experiment allowed students to see firsthand how different substances resist or respond to shifts in pH, an important concept in biology and chemistry. By directly comparing the effects of strong acids and bases, students gained a deeper understanding of how living organisms use buffers to maintain balance.

The Lady Panther scientists will complete the project by writing detailed lab reports. In addition to reinforcing the scientific method, the assignment is designed to strengthen critical thinking and writing skills that will aid them as they prepare for the ACT.

Hands-on activities like this one are a key part of Canton Academy's Advanced Biology program, giving students the opportunity to apply what they learn while preparing for future academic challenges.




Change air filters. Air filters on some air conditioning units require monthly cleaning or replacing.





Use fans to cool off. Ceiling fans, box fans and oscillating fans use very little electricity to circulate the air. Buy a programmable thermostat. A programmable thermostat can help manage costs, is controllable, and can help monitor usage.



Seal cracks and holes around doors, windows and ductwork. Weather stripping and caulk will help keep the cold air in and the hot air out.
